DISCUSSION, CONSIDERATION AND/OR ACTION TO APPROVE, ACCEPT, DENY, REMOVE OR TABLE ON:

1. Change Order Request #2 on GLO Water Well #5 Project

BEFCO Engineer Bradley Loehr presented Council with tables outlining the costs thus far of the GLO Water Well #5 project. He then told Council that during the 72-hour testing period, it was discovered that this well site had more capacity than was known before its drilling as comparable data for Water Well #4 was not available. Our engineer proposed to extend the underground well piping an additional 61 feet deeper than the original design to increase the flowrate from 250 to 280 GPM (gallons per minute). This would eventually add 50 more service connections. (Of course, an additional booster pump would boost

those numbers higher. The cost of the additional booster pump is more than the city can afford at present time; however, the "ask" for one was included in the PIF the city submitted to the Texas Water Development Board but was not invited to complete the longer application for funding.) This change order and costs associated with it will be covered "out of pocket" by the City of Burton for the amount of \$4,575.00. Mr. Loehr answered questions presented by Council and a motion was made by Councilmember Eckhardt and seconded by Councilmember Kalkhake to **APPROVE** the Change Order #2.

2. Approve Resolution 20251014R2 Authorizing the addition of not to exceed \$86,500 of Local Funds to cover the construction cost overruns between C. Miller Drilling Construction and the City of Burton for the GLO CDBG-MIT MOD Grant # 24-065-042-E534 — City of Burton Infrastructure Improvement Project

The City Secretary explained that the City had always known that the City would have to use local fund but just recently has the city received notification of the actual amount. With the help of the engineer and grant administrator, it was determined to use "not to exceed \$86,500" due to not knowing the whether Item #1 would be approved. - 1. GLO Contract #24-065-042-E534 Water Well #5 Mr. Loehr had covered most of the updates for this project in his presentation on Item #1. It is expected to have the new well completely operational before Thanksgiving.
- 2. 2023-2024 TDA CDBG Knittel Lift Station Rehab BEFCO Engineer Chad Emmel is the lead on this project. He has given the city a schedule moving forward. In early November, advertisements for bids will be published and opened around November 21. Contracting with the bid winner will be on the December agenda for council to vote on.
- 3. 2025 Texas Water Development Board DWSRF Project Information Form (PIF) the City of Burton was not asked to submit a complete project application. According to its engineer, the city needs to work on gaining "points" to be eligible in the future. Burton placed 84th out of 355 entries. Only the first 38 proposals were funded.
- 4. Texas Target Communities On Monday, October 6,2025, Rachel met with the Texas A&M student team of 4 that will be completing a wastewater project for Burton. She drove them around town showing them the lift stations, WWTP, and other applicable wastewater sites. They will be visiting Burton regularly in the next few months. The mayor also shared the video that was submitted with the application to Texas Target Communities prior to the city's acceptance to the program.

8. Ordinance 20251014 Providing for Specific Exemptions to Permitting Fees as Described in the Occupational Licenses and Business Regulations Ordinance of 2001

The city secretary's told council of research uncovering the purpose of the original enactment in 2000 requiring vendor permit fees was to pay for the city providing security at the Burton Cotton Gin Festivals. She also told council that, in her time of employment with the city, no one except the Texas Cotton Gin had ever paid any vendor fees. Her reasoning behind this Ordinance was to relieve the Texas Cotton Gin, Long Life Brotherhood and the Burton Heritage Society from the burden of collecting the fees now that the city does not provide security. Councilmember Eckhardt stated that if we were going to not require vendor fees from these non-profit organizations then the city should not require from any non-profit organization. This was discussed and council asked that the ordinance be revised to include all non-profits operating inside the city. A motion was made by Councilmember Eckhardt and seconded by Councilmember McLaughlin to **TABLE** for revisions.

Activities for the month of September included...

- *Attended the County Commissioner's Meeting on 9/2
- *Texas Target Communities -
- +Received, answered, and returned the 56 questions from the TAMU Capstone Students regarding their project with the City of Burton.
- +*Had a Teams Meeting (day before last Council Meeting) with the TAMU Capstone Class. Further interview questions + met and heard about the other projects that this class will be working on.
 - +Received email about the Captstone Team assigned to the city.
 - +Have exchanged multiple emails with the Team
 - +Paper copy and digital file were created of the WWTP for students to use.
 - +Meeting with the Team on Monday, September 22 on campus at TAMU
- *The monthly team meeting with the Governor's Land Office, Langford Community Servies, BEFCO Engineering, and city staff regarding movement forward for Water Well #5 was held IN PERSON at City Hall. This meeting included an on-site visit from the GLO to audit the city's files to ensure that all paperwork was in order.
- *Emailed Sherriff Holloway regarding the final items in the Property Room lockers; Indicated to him as well that once the final items were taken care of then the city would deal with the seized funds.

- *Worked on the fall newsletter to be sent out with utility bills at the end of September.

- *Continued work with legal, city secretary, and Knittels on the Utility Easement. After Council approved the Easement agreement, it was signed and closed with Quirt Knittel.
- *Met with Washington County Emergency Services Director Bryan Ruemke. Signed off on two Annexes to the Mitigation Goals for Washington County. The Annexes covered emergency plans and information on Haz Mat Oil Spills and Utilities. Also updated information for the City of Burton in the Utility Annex regarding emergency generators at the Water Plant & Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- *Attended a continuing education webinar.
- *Followed up with Utility Contractor, Utility Manager, TXDOT, and property owner regarding TXDOT construction and the ETJ water line.
- *Per request from Harrison Williamson with the Washington County Expo and the team gathering information about needs of the county, had a Teams meeting with Harrison and Hillary, Councilmember Paul, and myself to talk about the city/county partnership. Harrison had initially wanted to meet with the full Council, but scheduling was an issue. During the meeting with Paul, I asked if he and Hillary would like to meet with each council member as well. Email addresses or phone numbers were shared with them so they could follow up with rest of Council.
- *Received word via Bradley regarding the City of Burton's PIF with the TWDB. We did not get selected this year. We did learn that we ranked 84th out of 355 entries; the top 38 were funded. Only \$1 Billion dollars was available to be allocated.
- *Following up on a request regarding permit fees for vendors at festivals, spent time reading and researching the minutes up to a year before the resolution to understand the "why". No information found.

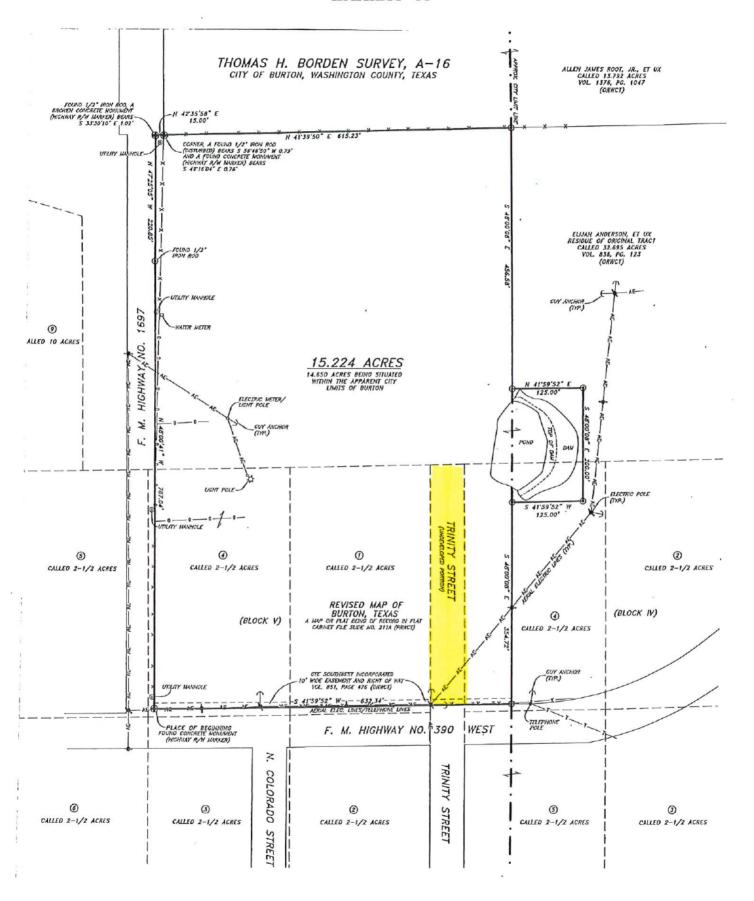
